A (Very Brief) User's Guide to the Gospel of Mark

Who?

- A 1st century Christian, probably Gentile but familiar with the Jewish roots of Christianity
- o Likely was not an eyewitness but had access to one or more eyewitnesses
- o Possibly (but not necessarily) one of the Marks mentioned in the NT

When?

- o Possibly as early as 50 AD
- o More likely around the time of the Jewish War (66-70 AD)
- Makes reference to persecution, which increased around the time of the Jewish War
- No reference, however, to tensions within the synagogue communities, which grew heated during the late 70s and the 80s AD

• Where?

- Most likely in Galilee
- Book has a strong Galilean focus
- o Mixed and Gentile Christian communities were common in Galilee
- o Rome is possible, but less likely

Why?

- o To preserve the tradition as the first generation of Christians were dying off
- o More importantly, to lay claim to that tradition in particular ways
- o Mark (and the other evangelists) shape their stories of Jesus in order to show that their theological assertions are grounded in the words and deeds of Jesus

Key Theological Concerns

- Openness to Gentiles, rootedness in Judaism
- Support for those who are wavering in the face of persecution
- Rightly understanding Jesus

Major Themes

- The Reign of God (It has come near!)
- Son of Man, Son of God
- Discipleship of the Cross
